why all the fuss?

- Employees at child care centers may not report to work smelling of smoke or strong scents used to mask smoke.
- No smoking is allowed on child care center property and there are no designated smoking areas.
- Employees may not leave the property or go to their vehicles during breaks to smoke.
- Thirdhand smoke can be on the seats of a car, or on the clothes, skin, and hair of a caregiver who smokes.
- These scents are particularly dangerous for infants because they are held close to hair, clothes, and skin.
 Infants often put their hands in their mouths after touching contaminated surfaces.
- Children exposed to thirdhand smoke are at increased risk for sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS).

- Thirdhand smoke is smoke left behind (harmful toxins) in places people have previously smoked cigarettes.
- Smell = Poison
- Dangers of exposure for adults include: higher risk for heart disease, stroke and other smoking-related diseases.
- Exposure increases childhood risk of asthma and aggravates existing asthma and allergies.
- The scent builds up over time and is resistant to normal household cleaning products.
- Airing out rooms, using fans or air conditioners or limiting smoking to just one room will not eliminate the scent.
